
'Don't be silly, Henry. There can't be!'

'There you are,' he announced triumphantly, pointing towards a dark corner, 'I told you so!'


In the end Paddington goes to live with the Brown family. Read the rest of the book, The Adventures of Paddington, to find out about the fun they all have together.


The branch came to an end and a little ladder ran through the cloud. Up the children went – and before they knew what had happened, they were out in the sunshine, in a new and very strange land.
